## Lesson Fourteen (February 17, 2016) Acts 21 (we will stay in Acts till we finish the book)

## Text: Acts 21 Questions:

- 1. Why does Luke, the historian, give such detail about the journey in 21:1-3?
- 2. Explain 21:4 about "through the Spirit they were telling Paul not to go to Jerusalem" because it looks like Paul went on to Jerusalem (21:17).
  - a. Was Paul disobedient to the Spirit?
- 3. What do you make of 21:5-6?
- 4. Drop down to 21:8.
  - a. Who is this Philip?
  - b. What is his connection with Paul (Saul at the time)?
  - c. Who did Saul consent to killing?
  - d. Was he one of the 7 along with Phillip?
  - e. How would Phillip feel about having his friend's murderer staying in his house with his 4 unmarried daughters?
  - f. What is this an example of -- something God does of us when we repent but we often struggle to do with each other.....
- 5. Explain what the prophet Agabus does to Paul in 21:10-11.
- 6. What reaction does this create in Luke and the others per 21:12?
- 7. Paul responds how in 21:13.
- 8. Explain whether 21:14 is appropriate for Paul's companions and for us today.
- 9. Jerusalem starts off fine -- in 21:17-18 who does Paul meet?
- 10. Paul tells them of his ministry with the Gentiles in 21:19 and the Jewish (most likely) brethren in Jerusalem react how towards God (21:20)?
- 11. But . . . trouble begins. Continuing in 21:20, how many Jewish christians are there in Jerusalem who are "zealous" for the old law?
- 12. The word on the street is Paul tells the Jews to stop doing what (21:21)?

- 13. What's the problem per 21:22?
- 14. The Jerusalem brethren propose a solution starting in 21:23. We don't have any verbal response by Paul so let's focus on what the brethren propose.
  - a. The four men are under a . .
    - i. What kind?
    - ii. Does it matter?
  - b. The brethren want Paul to pay for what (21:24)?
    - i. Why?
    - ii. This will lead others to believe what?
      - 1. Is this true or false? Explain
  - c. That was for the Jewish christians, but what about the Gentile christians?
    - i. 21:25 reminds us of what?
  - d. What does Paul do in 21:26?
    - i. Why?
- 15. Jews found Paul -- of course there were a lot of Jews in Jerusalem -- which Jews found Paul (21:27).
  - a. Should we expect enemies of the Gospel to be lazy?
  - b. Surprised when they are zealous?
- 16. What are the two accusations against Paul in 21:28?
  - a. Teaching?
    - i. True?
  - b. Physically doing something in the Temple?
    - i. True?
- 17. Learning about the problem with assumptions, what did the Jews assume to be true but was actually false (21:29).
  - a. (This lesson is also hammered home in John 9 -- major false assumption was what about someone born blind?)
- 18. How effective in getting the people angry against Paul (21:30)?
- 19. What did they intend to do to Paul (21:31)?
  - a. Who found out about the disturbance?
- 20. How quickly did the tribune act (21:32)?
  - a. What were the people doing to Paul when the soldiers arrived?

- 21. Put yourself in the place of the tribune -- you see a mob (including religious leaders) beating a man. What would you assume?
  - a. What did he do and say (21:33)?
  - b. What response from the crowd (21:34)?
  - c. Could the tribune understand over the noise?
  - d. So what did he do?
- 22. Paul's life was in so much danger what did the soldiers (you know, the guys with armor and swords) have to do (21:35)?
  - a. Why (21:36)?
- 23. Keeping in mind the crazy chaos of what has happened, and that Paul was following the instructions from James and the elders, notice how calm Paul is in 21:37. What does he say?
- 24. And the reaction from the tribune in 21:37-38?
- 25. Paul answers and makes a request in 21:39.
  - a. What is his answer?
  - b. What is his request?
    - i. Does this seem wise?
    - ii. Why did Paul do this?
- 26. In 21:40, what did Paul do with his hand?
  - a. The crowd did what?
  - b. Paul spoke in what language?
    - i. Is this the same or different than with the tribune?
    - ii. Why would he do this?
